parts of the state would be of great help. We also have two positions open for our road trip committee.


Although these are not elected positions they are very important to keep our road trip tradition continuing.

Jessi Combs killed attempting land speed record



TV personality and fellow Petro head Jessi Combs died in a crash while attempting to capture a land speed record of 500+ mph on a dry lake bed in Oregon's Alvord Desert. She was 39.

Combs was a veteran of jet-powered land speed racing. In 2013, she captured the title of fastest woman on four wheels when she piloted a modified fighter jet to an official two-way speed of 392.954 mph.

The goal of the recent attempt was to capture the outright women's land speed record of 512.7 mph, set by Kitty O'Neil in 1976. Details of the accident are limited, although at these speeds it's easy to see how a small deviation or equipment malfunction can turn fatal.

Combs was known for more than her racing exploits. Her numerous credits as a television personality included shows such as Mythbusters, Xtreme 4x4, All Girls Garage, and Overhaulin', where she showcased her fabrication talents and automotive knowledge. She was also an accomplished racer, placing first in class in the brutal King of the Hammers off-road race, as well as finishing the Baja 1000.

During Combs' tenure in the automotive media landscape, she served as a positive role model for enthusiasts, especially young women. Her contributions and passion for motorsports and automotive culture will be felt for generations to come.

Jaguar teases electric XJ due in 2020

Jaguar is set to launch an electric XJ for the next generation of the large, luxury sedan. However, it won't be a dedicated EV as previously thought. Instead, Jaguar will initially launch the electric version and then add gasoline-powered versions, Automotive News (subscription required) reported on Friday, citing an anonymous source.

The gasoline-powered versions will feature inline-6 engines, per the source. They will also likely be hybrids, as Jaguar Land Rover is committed to offering a fully electrified lineup by 2020.

The redesigned XJ, which is expected to be revealed next year, will be based on a new modular platform capable of spawning battery-electric powertrains. Called the Modular Longitudinal Architecture, or MLA for short, the platform makes its debut this year in a redesigned Land Rover Defender. The MLA is unrelated to the bespoke EV platform underpinning the Jaguar I-Pace.

Electric cars based on the MLA platform will have a 90.2-kilowatt-hour battery that will see them offer more than 250 miles, Jaguar Land Rover's head of product engineering, Nick Rogers, said during an investor presentation last month, according to Automotive News. Such a range would make the electric XJ a credible rival to the Tesla Model S and upcoming Porsche Taycan.

Hybrids based on the MLA platform will come in mildand plug-in hybrid flavors. The latter will feature 13.1kwh batteries that will be good for about 31 miles of range, Jaguar Land Rover has confirmed.

By introducing a modular platform, Jaguar Land Rover will be able to consolidate production and improve efficiencies. The automaker is on a significant cost-cutting drive aimed at stemming losses that resulted in a \$4.6 billion loss for the year ending March 31.

Update September 11, Frankfurt:

Jaguar Land Rover's big news for this week's Frankfurt International Motor Show was the redesigned 2020 Land

Rover Defender, but the British automaker also snuck in a teaser shot of its electric Jaguar XJ due next year.



The teaser appeared briefly during a speech made by Jaguar Land Rover CEO Ralph Speth, where he said the electric XJ will benefit from all of the lessons learned from Jaguar's I-Pace and Formula E programs.

The teaser doesn't reveal much although we do get a look at the new XJ's taillight graphic which appears similar to the design used on the updated 2020 Jaguar XE. It also appears that the graphic will continue across the full width of the rear.

What we know is that new XJ will be built at the same Castle Bromwich plant in the United Kingdom where the current XJ ceased production back in July. The plant is being transformed into an EV hub for Jaguar Land Rover; it will also be the automaker's main source for batteries and electric motors.

The new XJ will be the first model to ride on Jaguar Land Rover's new Modular Longitudinal Architecture (MLA) platform which will support mild-hybrid, plug-in hybrid and battery-electric powertrains. The platform will eventually underpin most models from the Jaguar and Land Rover brands.

Jaguar Land Rover hasn't said whether there will be versions of the new XJ with internal-combustion power, though according to a report from June we'll see gasoline engines in the new XJ but perhaps not at launch.

Jaguar's I-Pace hits a sweet spot

For this year's Monterey Car Week, Jaguar offered up its latest all-electric vehicle, the I-Pace, so that we could make it across the peninsula, into Carmel Valley for The Quail, and along Highway 68 to Laguna Seca for the Rolex Motorsports Reunion. It was our first time driving the car and we left with a new appreciation for electrics. The I-Pace offers 234 miles of range on a charge, which was more than enough to shuttle me, and occasionally some of my Hagerty teammates, around over the course of three days without needing any additional charge. Consider me surprised. We expected that being stuck in traffic with the air-conditioning on would sap the range—but it didn't. The trip odometer counting up and the range indicator ticking down seemed to be in concert the entire time.

Though we never had to charge the car, owners certainly will. The I-Pace will charge to full capacity overnight using Jaguar's home A/C charger. For longer trips or quick topoffs, public 50kW DC fast charging can take the I-Pace from 0–80 percent in 85 minutes, while 100kW chargers can do it in 45 minutes.

Due to its unique platform and electric drivetrain, Jaguar had much more freedom when designing the I-Pace. Jaguar designer Julian Thomson noted that both the I-Pace's long wheelbase—nearly 118 inches—and short overhangs hint at a long-distance machine that's athletic and graceful. We can attest that its range is impressive, especially given its roominess and performance, and its handling was superb—although we admit that we prefer the styling of the F-pace. The Jaguar style is there, it's just taking us some time to get used to the electric vehicle's unique proportions. It isn't a wagon, and it doesn't look quite like a traditional CUV. Perhaps that's a good thing for those that want to make a statement driving an electric vehicle.

Inside the I-Pace, Jaguar embraced the flexibility of designing around a new platform that was free of the constraints typically found in an internal combustion vehicle. With no need for a transmission tunnel, the I-Pace could have had a flat front floor. Rather than letting stray coffee tumblers and rogue handbags or sunglasses slide around down there, Jaguar went with a semi-floating console that allows for plenty of legroom. It's a bit of a pet peeve of mine that too many modern cars take up precious cabin space with a bulky shifter and console that offers little storage, which is often the case in large cars and crossovers. That, or there's a short console that only serves as a place to bash your shin, which is common on compact cars. The I-Pace avoids all those awkward ergonomics and provides a good balance between usable space —with a perfect road trip snack shelf without impeding the driver's ability to get comfortable. Indeed, the ample legroom and power seats were appreciated by our taller passengers.

Without an internal combustion engine to provide some white noise, the road sounds seemed a bit more prominent in the I-Pace at low speeds, such as the crunching of gravel under the tires. At highway speeds, the cabin's sound dampening was excellent, exactly as you'd expect from a Jaguar. Also as expected from a vehicle with a roaring hood ornament, passing is a simple matter. With no need to downshift and instant throttle response, especially when in Dynamic mode, the I-Pace can rocket around slow traffic effortlessly.


While those brief highway stretches proved it's a capable fast-lane cruiser, the electric car's strong suit is in town, where the driver can put its instant torque and all-wheel-drive to use when merging. Even knowing that its electric motors produce 394 horsepower, the off-the-line punch is surprising and instantly rewarding. Some of our passengers were startled by being pressed back into their seats when leaving from a stop light without a hint of wheelspin. The only sound is the increasing frequency heard as the motors spin up. Jaguar claims 0–60 in 4.5 seconds. We'd have guessed it was quicker.

For those looking for a luxury daily driver, the I-Pace delivers on practicality. Second-row passengers have plenty of room, thanks to that long wheelbase. The wide-opening hatch reveals a cargo area that offers 25.3 cubic feet of storage volume behind the rear seat. That space is right between the rear wheel wells, so it's not as wide as you may expect from a trunk or cargo, but it is easy to access and appropriately sized. How about up front? If you're expecting a sizable frunk you'll be disappointed. The I-Pace's modest front cargo area under the hood could maybe squeeze in three grocery bags or a medium-

size duffel. The bottom isn't flat, it's stepped, which reduces its usefulness.

Overall, we were impressed with the I-Pace's mix of practicality, power, and luxury. If funky doors and a third row aren't necessary, shoppers looking at Tesla's Model X may want to give the I-Pace a test drive. It beats the Model X on style and starts at \$69,500. In the realm of luxury electrics, that's a bargain—and for now, it has little competition.





Three reasons the car industry is struggling

News that Ford plans to close its Bridgend plant next year, with the loss of 1,700 jobs, is just the latest in a series of blows for the UK car industry.

In February, Honda said it would close its Swindon plant by 2021, with the loss of about 3,500 roles, while Jaguar Land Rover and Nissan are also cutting production and jobs.

It comes as carmakers around the globe struggle with a range of challenges, while consumers are buying fewer cars.

So what's holding manufacturers back?

1. Falling demand

After years of strong growth, global car sales were broad-

ly flat in 2018, largely because of a slump in demand in the world's biggest market, China.

It has hurt carmakers who had been doing brisk business in China, says Dave Leggett, editor of the car industry website just-auto.

"Trade tensions between Washington and Beijing have hit confidence in China generally. The economy was slowing down anyway, but that accentuated it," he says. Jaguar Land Rover has blamed its poor performance recently on falling Chinese demand, while Ford has pulled plans to sell a Chinese-made Ford Focus in the US because of the impact of trade tariffs.

The Chinese slump comes as demand in two other giant car markets, Western Europe and the US, has also slowed amid waning consumer confidence.

"It is creating more competition, which makes it tougher for everyone," Mr Leggett says.

2. Emissions woes

In Europe, emissions issues are also causing headaches for car firms.

Air quality concerns and taxation changes have led to a (Continued on page 12)

big drop-off in diesel sales, contributing to a 7% fall in new car registrations in the UK in 2018.

More challenging, perhaps, is the introduction of tough new CO2 emission standards, designed to tackle global warming, that make it much more expensive to build cars.

From 2021, manufacturers will face big fines in the EU if their fleets break agreed emissions limits, and these targets will get progressively tougher.

"Carmakers have to add on average €1,000 of content to cars to make them comply with the new rules," says Arndt Ellinghorst, an automotive industry analyst at Evercore ISI.

"It means consumers will be less inclined to buy, which only adds to the general slowdown in consumer confidence."

3. The electric challenge

To get their emissions levels down, carmakers are also going to need to sell a lot more electric vehicles, but

there are big obstacles in the way.

"A lot of carmakers are not ready to deliver electric vehicles at the right quantities," says Mr Leggett. "They need to change their operations and gear the cars much more to a mass market, but that requires investment." The other side of the problem is that the market isn't quite ready for electric cars.

Global sales of battery electric cars surged 73% in 2018 to 1.3 million units, but that was still just a fraction of the 86 million cars sold overall.

According to Dr Jonathan Owens, supply chain and logistics expert at the University of Salford Business School, one issue is the lack of charging infrastructure on roads in Europe and the US, although he says China is making great strides in this area.

Another is about the limited range of some mid to lower-market electric cars.

"Ford has had an electric Ford Focus since 2011, but the range is hopeless compared to competitors at less than 100 miles," Dr Owens says.

"And the VW golf can only drive for about 120 miles."
